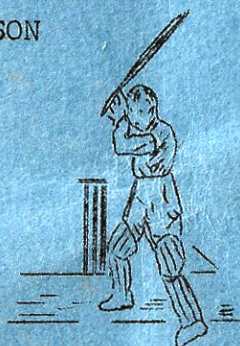

On the Administrative side the Club acted, I feel with their usual good judgment and your Committee served you in their most able manner.

May I add my thanks to the Groundsman for preparing wickets second to none at Mona Park and to the Council for their continued support of the Club.

Finally, I wish to express my sincere thanks to all those

officials and players who performed the sometimes onerous jobs in order that each Saturday's cricket provided a pleasurable day. May we look forward to continuing success in the coming season.

MEET THE "A" GRADE PLAYERS.

TREVOR BRISCOE : Trevor had his most successful season since joining the Club, his 359 at an average of 27.62 was a very fine performance. Trevor has a good defence, and his technique improves with every Innings, his best score for the season was 108 against Roseville.

JOHN SKINNER : John unfortunately sustained an ankle injury during the football season and this plagued him throughout the season. He was our best bowler in the Grand Final, his figures of 2-48 and 2-42 were not a true indication of the trouble he caused the batsmen. John, when in the team, gave us new life in the field; his slip catching, as usual, was brilliant.

LES HOWARD : Les once again demonstrated his value as a middle order batsman; he was always prepared to attack the bowling, and his timing is something for the young players to watch. Les' best innings being a hard-hitting 31 (2nd Inns.) in the Grand Final. A good club man.

HARRY SCHWEBEL : Harry is the team's most gifted batsman; his footwork and stroke play are something for the young players to take note of. Harry suffered from lack of opportunity at the start of the season, but when promoted in the batting order scored 200 runs in seven games. A very keen cricketer.

GEORGE PARRY (Vice-Captain) : George again proved to be our top bowler, taking 46 wickets at a cost of 10-93 per wicket. Against Roseville he turned in a beautiful spell of bowling, taking 6-63 from 24 overs. With the bat George had a mixed season, his 58 in the Grand Final was a glorious innings and a fitting reward. His fielding was always top class.

BOB CASSEL : Bob topped the batting averages and finished second in the aggregate. A lovely innings of 110 not out against Burwood and a hard-hitting 60 (2nd Inns.) in the Grand Final will long be remembered by those who witnessed them. A good fieldsmen in any position.

BILL BALFOUR : Bill, after missing the first three games, bagged 31 wickets at a cost of 16.13 per wicket; Bill's best effort being 7.31 from 17 overs against Pennant Hills. His 63 with the bat against Roseville was pretty to watch. A great team man.

HILTON HARRISON : Hilton shared the spin department with Bill Balfour, he flighted the ball well on occasions. Hilton finished the season with 36 wickets. He was always reliable with the bat and batted according to circumstances. Very keen both on and off the field.

LES MARKS : Les, a newcomer to the Club, played some very sound knocks during the season; his 48 and 30 in the Grand Final showed all the promise of an opening batsman of class, has a

fine defence and can attack when required. We hope he can take up next season where he finished this one.

NOEL MATHEWS : Injuries suffered at baseball contributed to Noel's mediocre average compared with last season. Nevertheless, he showed flashes of real brilliance on occasions and next season should see him back to his best. A good clubman.

PETER WOOD : Peter also had a mediocre time while in "A" grade, seeming to lack the confidence which usually characterises his batting. Came good with a vengeance in "B" Grade.

LES WATKINS : His best performance in "A" grade was his 5-19 against Canterbury. A hostile bowler when able to "harness" his swing. Lacked opportunity with the bat.

KEITH GRIFFITHS : High scoring skipper of the "B" grade. Played only one match and unfortunately run-out.

TERRY POWTER : Pressed into service Terry was mainly responsible for our win over Lane Cove with his powerful driving.

BOB HADLEY : One of our very promising youngsters. Excellent debut with the bat in first game. His fielding is an object lesson, which others could well copy. A car accident restricted his appearances late in the season.

RAY HOLMES : Bowled well without luck at only appearance. Another promising youngster.
