## "A" GRADE

The "A" Grade again finished in 10th place in a generally disappointing season.

Many of our games were lost with victory virtually in our grasp as the result of our first round match against Roseville will illustrate. Chasing 244, our openers put on 132 for the first wicket, but the rest of the side did not buckle down to the job and we were all out for 218. With another season under our belts it is to be hoped that we will in future show more determination especially when the result of the game is so close.

Amongst the individual performances, special mention must be made of the new Club Record Aggregate of 628 runs set by Ted Suchy. Ted was one batsman who could be relied upon to score runs regularly, and this effort, produced on a home ground smaller than Mona Park, would surely be worth 800 or 900 runs at least.

In his first full season in the driver's seat, Les showed himself to be a shrewd tactician and although his personal performances suffered slightly from the strain and responsibility he was carrying, he gained the utmost respect and co-operation from his players.

## "B" GRADE

This side was the only one of our three teams to show an improvement on last season's performances, finishing in 5th position. A glance at the individual batting and bowling figures will show that the "B" Grade's was essentially a team effort. No one player excelled over the above his teammates and this is ample illustration of the excellent team spirit shown throughout the season.

The "B" Grade probably suffered most from the unusual lack of players available for selection this year. If the side had not been continually changed a better effort could reasonably have been expected.

Dave Tribolet led the side as efficiently and capably as always and showed that experience is just as important as youthful exuberance.

#### THE "B" GRADE PLAYERS

PHIL PERKINS (Vice Captain): Once again, Phil proved himself a reliable and consistant opening bat by scoring 351 for the season. Even though Phil had some good individual scores and finished with a good average, this does not always show the value of an opener, as on quite a number of occasions he was the mainstay of some good partnerships. Also did a fine job behind the stumps when required and was of great assistance to me on the field.

<u>DAVID NOYES</u>: David came to us from the "A"s and took some time to settle down, but once he did, he showed the ability he possesses and his unbeaten century against Ryde in even time will certainly be remembered for some time. Also is a very enthusiastic and exceptionally good fieldsman - a fine young player.

GRAHAM BERRY: Graham had a mixed season - started well with the bat and the ball, however both fell away to a degree, as the season progressed and consequently his performances were not as good as expected. However, he still won the bowling average and had one or two good knocks with the bat.

ERIC BURGIN: The "veteran" of the side, who showed his class by easily winning the batting average. Was very consistant with the bat in the limited number of games he played and if he had completed a full season in the side! feel sure he would have given the club record aggregate a "shake".

<u>WAL SHEPHERD</u>: Wal proved to be the surprise allrounder of the team. On his first venture with the ball, he took 5 for 29, and in this department was a real asset to the side. Was his usual reliable self with the bat and finished second in the batting averages.

PAT PERCY: The player who earned the title of "Mr. Reliable", as on no occasion during the season did Pat fail with the bat. He did not get high scores, but his consistancy mainly contributed to the number of good partnerships we experienced. He scored the most number of runs and this was a good effort considering he played a number of games in the "A" Grade.

KEVIN CHEVELL: Another player who came from the "A"s. Kevin did not completely fulfil the promise he showed the previous season, although he still has tremendous ability and bagged 22 wickets at an average of 13.90 in eight games and just missed winning the bowling average for the second successive year.

<u>BOB HADLEY</u>: Bob also did not have a complete season, however he was a most reliable bowler, taking 21 wickets at 14.00 each. After a promising start with the bat, when he made a glorious 72 not out against Bexley, his batting fell away, due mainly to a recurring back injury.
